





Combatting the harmful "Model Minority" Myth

The model minority myth is an anti-Asian tool created by white supremacy to undermine anti-Asian racism.

It was first associated with Japanese Americans in an attempt to forget about the illegal incarceration of Japanese-North Americans during WW2 by perceiving them as "successful."

By positioning Asians as "model minorities," the myth has also used Asians as "proof" that people of colour can "make it" if they tried "hard enough."

This has rendered Asians to be perceived as close to whiteness, and therefore under suspicion. It's a tool that pits racialized groups against each other, targetting other people of colour as "too lazy" and perpetuating anti-Blackness and anti-Indigenous settler colonial complacency.
