VIII) Special Presentations (55 minutes)

- A. Nautical Yearbook Updates (Chief Editor Arellano 10 minutes)
 - i. Carissa Arellano gave a presentation about the history, how to get involved and social media about the Nautical, as well as information about their team and new publishing company (treering.com)
 - 1. This presentation will be added as a supporting document
 - The code to use on treering is 101475603518586 or typing in "California State University Channel Islands"

- They are looking for students who want to get involved and can be: photographers, writers, copy editors and social media assistants
- 4. Senator Ewing asked Chief Editor Arellano if she has contacted clubs about the yearbook and how they reacted
 - a. She answered yes and that some organizations have been very excited about the yearbook
- 5. Advisor Alatorre encouraged Student Government to purchase yearbooks and to highlight our events on the customizable pages, we could then show these yearbooks while tabling
- 6. Senator Ewing asked what the deadline is for clubs to submit information
 - a. Chief Editor Arellano answered that it depends on which section they would belong to

- B. Academic Placement and Support Subcommittee (Advisor Alatorre and Senator Lincoln 25 minutes)
 - i. Advisor Alatorre and Senator Lincoln talked about the progress of the Academic Placement and Support subcommittee
 - ii. The following survey was discussed and has information regarding the executive orders 1110 and 1100: <u>https://tinyurl.com/APS-survey2017</u> or <u>https://csuci.qualtrics.com/jfe/form/SV_6eVrT6FvepK9fAF</u>
 - iii. The chancellor's office is looking into ways that the CSU can support students other than remedial courses, as remedial courses no longer exist in the CSU
 - iv. Advisor Alatorre mentioned that an important discussion in the subcommittee is the issue of who will pay for the extra trainings
 - v. Senator Ewing asked if English placement tests will be taken away, it was answered yes that both placement tests for math and English will be taken away
 - vi. Senator Christopher asked about Peer Mentors being added to additional courses
 - 1. Senator Lincoln added that they are looking to add peer mentors to freshman courses and courses for first generation students
 - vii. Senator Perez encourages the idea that students should be able to pick their own block schedule
 - viii. Senator Perez asks how it will be determined what classes students should go into
 - 1. It was answered that they are unsure and are looking to figure that out depending on the answers they receive from the survey
 - ix. Senator Ewing asked how student feedback will be implemented into faculty training about what techniques work
 - 1. They encourage her to include this question in comments on the survey

- x. Senator Ewing wants to clarify that "critical classes" are English and math courses
 - 1. It was answered yes
- xi. Senator Ewing asks when this is supposed to be implemented
 - 1. It was answered that it must be implemented by Fall 2018
- vii. Vice President Mumford asked if the research was conducted within the CSU or specifically at CI, what kind of research it was, was there research regarding how the 102, 103, & 105 courses were taught, and if students were to be allowed to opt in/out of block schedules
 - It was answered that it was research from CI, it was research regarding pass/fail rates and student success rates, courses being taught by grad students could be part of the issue and this was considered, the idea that students could opt in/out is a current idea
- xiii. Senator Ewing asked if any members know students who have taken these English courses
- xiv. President Hinojosa mentioned that some changes are already being made to orientation such as transfer orientations being moved to later in the summer to allow more time to evaluate transcripts
- C. Integrative Excellence Subcommittee at 10:00 A.M. (Vice President Sawyer 20 minutes)
 - i. Dr. Marie Francois gave a presentation about the subcommittee in place for Dr. Sawyer due to a family emergency
 - ii. The presentation about the subcommittee will be added as a supporting document
 - iii. Dr. Francois stated that most campuses have a faculty development center, and although CI used to, we no longer do; the resources that this center used to give us is something the subcommittee is hoping to revitalize
 - 1. It is important to come up with ways to access the faculty to see if this additional training helped or not
 - iv. Senator Ewing asked about the dropout rate of the nursing program, are there ways that CI can work on keeping our students
 - 1. Dr. Francois answered that there are resources and strategies that they are currently work on to ensure students do not leave; this is why the health sciences major was created
 - v. Vice President Mumford asked if the faculty success programs would be mandatory or voluntary
 - 1. Dr. Francois answered that it would more than likely be voluntary
 - vi. Vice President Mumford asked about the reaction from Student Affairs and getting them intertwined into academics
 - 1. Dr. Francois mentioned that she will be receiving feedback from Student Affairs later today

Expand Learning Communities

- Clusters
 - · Faculty development opportunities and RTP connections to incentivize faculty participation and foster cross-course collaboration.
 - · Mission Centers link to academic advisor and Student Affairs partner associated with Learning Communities
 - · Groups funded to attend Washington Center trainings for three years

Expand Learning Communities (cont.)

- · Forging partnerships with Divisions of Student Affairs, University Advancement, Technology and Innovation, Business and Financial Affairs and Academic Affairs in order to ensure quality and promote institutionalization
 - Student Affairs builds orientation materials, events and activities around LC/LLCs while supporting LC/LLC co-curricular and extracurricular programming
 - University Advancement (Foundation) partners develop familiarity with learning communities to promote them to donors
 - University Advancement (Communication and Marketing) develop familiarity with learning communities and identify opportunities to promote LCs and their activities
- · Student Affairs (Career Development Services) will work with Learning Communities for career exploration and internships related to LC themes
- · Orient scholarships to match with learning communities



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Institutionalize Student Research

- Create a Center for Student Research
- Invest permanent funding for existing Student Research initiatives, including support for student travel to conferences
- Preserve and institutionalize the Summer SURF faculty-mentored student research program
- Add an advisor to promote major scholarship opportunities (e.g., CSU Doctoral, Goldwater, Truman, etc.) and help prepare students to apply for these opportunities
- Coordination among Capstone and Major Research Classes across schools

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Institutionalize Student Research (cont.)

- · More support for annual SAGE Conference
- · Work with the Writing Center to prepare students for conferences
- · Work with the Library to create a Digital Scholarship Lab
- Work collaboratively and concert with the Divisions of Student Affairs, University Advancement, Business and Financial Affairs, Technology And Innovation and Academic Affairs

Faculty Success Programs

- Workshops offered by Student Affairs departments on student development, undocumented students, students with disabilities, "students of concern"
- Coordination with grant-funded faculty development programs, with goal of institutionalizing

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Early Intervention Career/Academic Advising

Inter-divisional project to work with students, faculty, and staff to identify and pursue opportunities to improve aspects of student advising that relate to career advising, collaboration between Career Development Services, Academic Advising, Center for Community Engagement, CAPS

- Undeclared and pre-nursing students have high drop out rates (>40%): - early connection to academic and career advising and experiential learning opportunities
 - Students explore relationships to and differences between major and career
- Internships key benchmarking indicator of career preparation:
 - Advisors and Career Counselors work together to integrate internships early into a cademic planning

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15 to Finish

- Create a holistic communication plan to encourage on-time graduation by investing in a
 university messaging campaign that urges students to take a full load of classes (15 units)
 every semester.
- Some CI students operate under the mistaken belief that 12 units is "full time" (true for financial aid, but bad for their pocketbook).
 For instance:
 - Four year cost at 15 units per semester: 6802 x 4 = 27,208
 - Four year cost at 12 units per semester: 6802 x 5 = 34,010
 - 15 to Finish saves you almost \$7,000
- Challenge: how to promote this while recognizing that many student need to work for living expenses and to contribute to family income.
- More scholarships to make it possible
- · More availability of courses needed, especially those to take in sequence.
- · Robust summer term @ CI and advising about supplementing community college classes



Other Synergies: Stand Alone or Woven In

- Synergy among and support for the Affinity and Marginalized Student Stoling/Chord Celebrations – Si Se Pudo, Black Student Stoling Ceremony, Lavender Lunch Chord Ceremony, Undoca Student Stoling Ceremony, etc., tying the event into the Mission
- Mission-Based Centers (MBCs) -- Increase interconnection among MBCs, sustained connections to both courses and student affairs programming and sufficient staffing – embedded in other proposals
- General Education Theme Tracks (pending GE policy implementation):
- Mission Centers, in close consultation with Departments and Chairs, will design GE Tracks,
- Each track will have a dedicated academic advisor
- Tracks can be "grafted" onto LCs to create a minor or endorsement on completion

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Other Synergies (cont): Stand Alone or Woven In

- Improve communication throughout campus -- about programs, activities and events regarding opportunities for faculty, students, and staff.
- Outcome synergy (while maintaining additional specific ones) between the curriculum and the co-curriculum
 - Lacayo Internships drawing on GE outcomes and Program Internship outcomes
 - ROI programming drawing on SLOs for multicultural courses
 - Student Leadership assessment: Honor Societies, Student Government, Associated Students participation, Student Clubs, etc.
